



HUD Youth Demonstration Program Overview:


- Exciting new initiative designed to reduce the number of youth experiencing homelessness.
- National Competitive Grant process – submitted April 2018.
- Evaluation of programs will inform the federal effort to prevent and end youth homelessness going forward. Selected cities will serve as leaders in the nation on the work to end homelessness among young people.




HUD Awards \$43 Million to 11 communities


YHDP Round 2 Timeline






What does HUD expect of selected communities?

- Communities will work with HUD technical assistance teams to develop and implement a coordinated community plan (CCP) to prevent and end youth homelessness.
- *A first draft* of the CCP must be completed and submitted to HUD within 4 months of the announcement of community selection (November 13, 2018).
- CoCs will have 4 months to submit a coordinated community plan, and up to 4 additional months to address comments from HUD.



Selected communities expectations (continued):

- *Requests for planning and implementation funding* will be made on a rolling basis and must be accounted for in the CCP.
- The local YHDP team will include, at a minimum, the youth action board and public child welfare agencies included as a threshold requirement in the YHDP application.
- The local YHDP team is expected to engage all the partners included in their YHDP application Collaboration Chart and as many of the other local stakeholders listed in the YHDP Notice of Funding Availability as possible.
- Communities will try new approaches, models, and methodologies, and work with HUD to share their experiences with these innovations with the rest of the country.



Next Steps

- SAMSHA TA assistance - planning in Washington DC Aug. 7-9
- At this forum a team of 4 will attend to meet our TA team face to face and other award recipient communities
- As a Demonstration grant – participate in program evaluation
- Implement full project plan/meetings for stakeholders and Youth Advisory Board (YAB) members and formalize YAB role



Each YHDP community is supported by one of these TA firms:






What will it fund?

YHDP recipients will use funding for rapid rehousing, permanent supportive housing, and transitional housing, and to fund innovative programs, such as host homes. Recipients can begin requesting funding for specific projects as soon as they are ready.


YHDP will also support youth-focused performance measurement and coordinated entry systems.



What HUD said about San Diego's vision on ending youth homelessness


The award will move the Task Force forward in:

1. Creating appropriate system capacity;
2. Full implementation of a youth coordinated entry system;
3. Emphasizing prevention and diversion;
4. To identify and quickly link all homeless youth to tailored and scaled housing and services;
5. To prevent end youth homelessness.
