

RANKING STRATEGIES AND PROTOCOLS 2019 NOFA

The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) requires local Continuum of Care (CoC) areas to review and rank-order applications to be submitted to HUD under the annual CoC Competitive Notice of Funding availability (NOFA).

The project ranked order is developed from a variety of factors such as the project raw score from the application scorecard (generated by Simtech in 2019), HUD and local priorities, and compliance with local and HUD quality project review guidelines. The process relies heavily on objective data, demonstrated capacity, measured performance, and alignment with local priorities.

Basic strategies and protocols for rank-ordering projects within the two tiers required by HUD are summarized below.

The HUD national review for projects in Tier 2 differs from those in Tier 1. The HUD NOFA describes Tier 2 funding as including the balance of Tier one funding plus bonus funds. Planning dollars are technically not ranked and fall outside either tier. The local process takes into account the difference in the way HUD handles Tier 2 evaluation. The chart below summarizes the local Tier 2 protocols.

Ranking Strategies and Protocols for Projects in Tier 2
