The calculation below references what needs to occur, based on August 2023 data, to reach Functional Zero by September 2024

Built for Zero Glossary of Terms

Active Homeless Number: Single Adult Veterans, age 25 and older who are experiencing homelessness in San Diego County.

Newly Identified: Veterans who are “touching” our system for the first time during the reporting month.

Returned to Active List from Housing: This category encompasses individuals who were previously housed through the community’s homeless response system but have since returned to homelessness during the reporting month. The most recent exit from the homeless response system for this individual would have been to a permanent housing destination, and they have now re-entered homelessness.

Returned from Inactive: This includes individuals who were previously designated as inactive by the community but have since reappeared or have returned to homelessness during the reporting month. Their most recent exit from the system would have been to inactive status, and they are now again identified as being on the active list.

Housing Placements: This represents the total number of single adult veterans experiencing homelessness who moved into permanent housing during the reporting month.

Moved to Inactive: This refers to the total number of individuals experiencing homelessness who have been categorized as "inactive" in the community's By-Name Data set during the reporting period.

The "inactive" status is assigned to individuals and/or households who cannot be located. Communities typically move individuals marked as "inactive" to an archived section of their By-Name List, based on a designated "no-contact" threshold of 90 days.

In cases where the duration of a potential institutional stay (e.g., hospitalization, jail, etc.) is uncertain, keep them on your active list for 90 days. If their institutional stay extends beyond 90 days, they will move to "inactive" list.

No Longer Meets Population Criteria: This includes the total number of persons experiencing homelessness who no longer meet the criteria for their respective subpopulation or population designation.

Although infrequent, there are times when persons experiencing homelessness may have a change in subpopulation status. This may occur when a self-reported veteran is confirmed as a non-veteran after checking with the VA, or a person who initially reported meeting HUD’s chronic definition but was later found not to meet this definition. Changes in population status can also cause this, for example, when a child enters an adult-only household, or a youth ages into the single adult population.

Functional zero for veteran homelessness

Functional zero means that fewer veterans are experiencing homelessness than can be routinely housed in a month, with a minimum threshold of average three-month housing rate.
